The seminar took place in Savannah and Atlanta in Georgia in the United States. SCAD is called the 'University for Creative Careers', and is one of the few premier visual arts universities in the United States.

## From the Chaplain

At the end of our first term the Christian Union organised our "Gospel Week" for this academic year. Once again, along with the teacher advisors to the CU, they put on a full programme, based on the verse from Psalm 62 "He alone is my rock and my salvation."

It was good to have Father Desmond Cox from St John's Cathedral join us for the Eucharist during Gospel Week. He spoke about his own life as a young man, faced with the choice of chasing earthly prizes or following the call of God. It is a choice which will face every generation. One of the things a Church School, such as St Paul's, can do is to equip our boys with the skills they need in the future when they may need to make similar decisions.

A group of boys also went to see the new film "Exodus" by Ridley Scott. It recounts the famous story of Moses who led his people to freedom. One thing which is very striking about the film (which itself is well over two hours long) is how long it took Moses to make that decision! He was comfortable in his life within the palace of Pharaoh and did not want to listen to what was being said about his true heritage. It was a long time before he accepted his past and followed the call of God to lead his people from slavery to freedom.

This newsletter will be coming out while our Assembly theme is that of 'Vocation'. How God calls each and every one of us to his service. Some of those vocations will be to the priesthood and St Paul's has, over the years, had a number of boys go on to be ordained as priests. But God calls us to His service in many different ways. During our vocation week we have Father Will Newman from St Stephen's College and also Father Bill Robertson from DBS speaking at the College and about how God uses us all in His service.

If the boys of St Paul's are able to learn to put their trust in God and find in Him a refuge, to listen to His voice and respond to His call, then they will have a life skill which is more valuable than any other. For He alone is our rock and our salvation.

### Law Society Of Hong Kong - Teen Talk Hong Kong

On 29<sup>th</sup> November 2014 (Saturday), eight boys from SPC participated in Teen Talk HK, an annual programme organized by the Law Society of Hong Kong. This annual event invites several thousand students from all over Hong Kong to participate in a discussion about legal and social issues in the society. This year's theme for the talk was cybercrime; in particular the legal nuances of cyber bullying, pirating, and the necessity of monitoring the Internet. The day ended in a debate on whether the Internet should be monitored. Forty students were selected from the crowd, and eight were selected to be speakers for the proposing and opposing team respectively. A further six students were chosen to be floor speakers for either side. Our school was fortunate enough to have two students selected; one as a floor speaker for the affirmative team, and one as the conclusion speaker for the opposing team. Our student, Hysan Woo won the best debater award.
